Requests for pre-registration are due in writing by Friday, 5/3, by 5pm. Pre-registration will be Wednesday, 5/15. No exceptions will be made to pre-registration deadlines. Registration for Certificate Program classes is ongoing.

Registration during the first week of classes is considered late registration and carries a \$10 late fee per class. First-time students will be charged a \$50 application fee. A minimum of one-third of the total tuition and fees is due at registration. An additional one-third of the total tuition and fees is due prior to the first day of the quarter. Tuition per quarter unit is \$450.

Certificate Program tuition is due in full at the time of registration and is non-refundable with fewer than 3 days notice prior to the start date of the class, except for Vision Quest, which requires 4 weeks notice to cancel.

ABOUT THE NEW EARTH INSTITUTE

Introducing The NEW EARTH INSTITUTE

We are pleased to announce the New Earth Institute of Southwestern College. For over 30 years, Katherine Ninos has been the director of what has been called SWC's "Community Education Programs" (or CEP). The CEP programs have included professional training certificates, the Transformation and Healing conference, lectures, and other programs and trainings. Why the new name? My view on this is that the energy generated by these initiatives and the scope and diversity of the offerings has outgrown the name "Community Education Programs." A larger energetic container was needed to hold what these programs have become.

When President Jim Nolan asked if I had an idea for a new name, "The New Earth Institute" came to me immediately. I just knew that was the name. It is, of course, a biblical allusion, and shows up most prominently in the Book of Revelation (the Apocalypse). In that book, "a new heaven and a new earth" become the metaphor for a transformed and higher consciousness, available to us when we move beyond the limited world of form, ego, personality and fear. Eckhart Tolle borrowed the phrase, explaining that, for him, the "new heaven" would be an inner experience, and a "new earth" would be the out-picturing in form of that higher consciousness. Out of that comes the tag-line, "Transdimensional Teaching for the World Community."

CREATE A STORY: A TRANSPERSONAL PROCESS WITH CHILDREN

In this course, participants will employ various transpersonal cross-cultural techniques with the expressive arts to broaden their perspective on the many challenging life experiences facing children today, as well as deepen understanding and awareness of the importance of creating environments that support both the physical and spiritual growth of young children. These ancient techniques are found in all cultural traditions and are based on the Four Universal Healing Principles. This experience provides an opportunity to understand the transpersonal forces that surround and strengthen the young child during the first seven years of life, and opens the "imaginal doorway," creating an entry point for these forces to assist in the transformational process.

Claudia Raphael, MA, ATR-BC, LPAT, LMT, CIMI, has worked with young children and families for over 30 years. She has developed many transpersonal programs based on indigenous wisdoms. MBEP is a mindful, body-centered approach to activating intrinsic emotional processing in the brain. The processing is activated and maintained by the client's and the therapist's mindful, Felt Sense Attention upon the client's somatic experience. The client's emotional processing is enabled, focused, and supported through the attuned relational connection between the therapist and the client. MBEP is a practical, useful method for initiating and promoting essential emotional processing. It can easily be incorporated into any therapeutic modality.



Robert Weisz, Ph.D., the developer of Mindfulness-Based Emotional Processing, is a clinical psychologist and director of the Milton Erickson Institute of New Mexico and the Brainspotting and Hypnotherapy Clinic. He is the author of numerous scientific articles, two book chapters, and a series of healing journey CDs. The ceremony of vision quest has long been practiced in indigenous cultures to assist with major life transitions. It is a deeply transformative experience in which participants spend four days out of ten alone on the land with no food and a minimum of material comforts. The three stages of rite of passage are guided by experienced facilitators.

Carol Parker, Ph.D., LPCC, is the director of the Transformational Ecopsychology Certificate Program at SWC. She is trained as a vision quest guide with the School of Lost Borders and has studied with indigenous healers from the Amazon and the Andes. HEALTHY HEALER, HEALTHY ETHICS

This workshop will attempt to illustrate how the cause of most ethical and unethical behavior is not a lack of basic knowledge, but is related to the use and misuse of the strengths that bring us into this field. We will address:

- Principles of ethics of the American Counseling Association and the American Psychological Association.
- Personal and professional factors influencing the application of ethical principles, identifying vulnerabilities, and building resilience as the core of an ethical approach.
- Individual factors including therapist fatigue and countertransference.
- Staying healthy, balanced and managing risk.
- The applicability of ethical principles to clinical practice with regard to:
 - Higher risk clients
 - Managing requests for information in different situations
 - Electronic records and communication
 - Social media
 - Specific ethical areas identified by workshop participants



Dr. Santistevan is currently the director of the CARE Program of the New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute in Las Vegas. This program provides services to adolescents who have a major mental illness and sexually harmful behaviors. He maintains a small private practice offering psychological testing, individual and family therapy.
